

What are hot jobs?

Hot jobs are forecasted to grow faster than the overall statewide rate of 1.8% from 2017 to 2019 **and** also create at least 50 new jobs annually. Therefore, hot jobs possess robust growth potential as well as produce a significant number of new job opportunities. This list is dominated by *food preparation and serving occupations* which account for 10 of the 25 hot jobs.

What do you need to get a hot job?

Many of the hot jobs need only high school or less education, no related work experience, and only short-term on-the-job training. A few do require experience up to 5 years or moderate-term on-the-job training. The jobs that require some college or a degree do not need on-the-job training and usually no related work experience either.

What is the best hot job?

The fastest growing occupation is *home health aides* with 7.7 percent. The job with the most new jobs created annually is *food preparation and serving workers* with 390.

What does a hot job pay?

Median wages are included to show the earning potential of the 'hot jobs'. The statewide median wage was \$41,650 in 2017. All of the jobs requiring at least a Bachelor's degree have above-average median wages. The other two jobs with above average pay was bartenders (\$45,120) and general maintenance and repair workers (\$45,340), both needing high school or less education.

Education, related work experience, and on-the-job training levels are assigned by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). Size of occupation is the employment level in first quarter 2017. Growth rate and new jobs created annually are based on employment projections from first quarter 2017 to first quarter 2019. Total annual openings include new jobs created annually plus openings that occur when someone transfers to a different type of occupation and also when someone exits the labor force entirely. Median annual wage is from the BLS 2017 Occupational Employment Statistics survey.
