

Hawaii It's All About Jobs!

Using LED to Reveal Employment Dynamics for Local and Regional Analysis


Data from the Local Employment Dynamics (LED) Partnership provide unprecedented detail about Hawaii's jobs, workers, and local economies. This document highlights some recent employment trends in the state using the OnTheMap, QWI Explorer and J2J Explorer applications.

J2J Explorer

- 52% of all hires in Hawaii come from workers that were previously not employed. This decreases to 49% of all hires when looking only at hires into Manufacturing jobs. (Source: [J2J Explorer's](#) Job-to-Job Flows data, 2015 Q2)

- Workers hired into Hawaii jobs from out-of-state primarily go into Accommodation and Food Services, Retail Trade, Administrative and Support Services, and Health Care and Social Assistance. (Source: [J2J Explorer's](#) Job-to-Job Flows data, 2015 Q2)

- Workers flowing into Hawaii from California are more likely to be hired into jobs in Educational Services than workers hired from other states. Workers flowing from Washington into Hawaii are more likely to be hired into Construction jobs, while workers flowing into the state from Arizona are more likely to be hired into jobs in Manufacturing. OnTheMap

- 10% of Urban Honolulu CDP's workers live in East Honolulu or Pearl City, but only 3% of workers living in Urban Honolulu are employed in East Honolulu or Pearl City. (Source: [OnTheMap's](#) LODES data, 2014)

- 48% of workers flowing into Urban Honolulu for work earn more than \$3,333 a month, but only 37% of workers that leave the city for work are in that monthly earnings category. (Source: [OnTheMap's](#) LODES data, 2014)

QWI Explorer

- The Utilities industry paid the highest average monthly earnings (stable employment) for Hawaii and Maui counties (\$6,520 and \$6,998, respectively), while Honolulu and Kauai county's highest paying industries are Mining/Quarrying/Oil/Gas Extraction and Management of Companies/Enterprises (\$8,380 and \$7,703, respectively). - The Accommodation and Food Services industry had the highest job creation (firm level) in Hawaii (3,913 jobs). Firms in Construction and Retail Trade created the next most jobs (3,324 and 2,878, respectively). (Source: [QWI Explorer's](#) Quarterly Workforce Indicators, average of 2015's four quarters)
